Regent's Message

South Carolina ACHE members, it is my pleasure to update you all on ACHE activities from the June Board of Governors Meeting.

Business Update:

Finance: The Board of Governors reviewed and approved financial statements for the current period and accepted ACHE's and the Foundation of ACHE's consolidated 2022 financial audit. ACHE received a clean audit opinion with no internal control concerns reported.

Growth: ACHE membership is experiencing a modest growth as of April 30th with new member recruitment being particularly strong. There is a healthy pipeline of eligible members to take the BOG of exam.

There are initiatives underway to increase the number of Fellows and <u>Fellow applicants</u>. <u>Look for a digitally focused campaign for FACHE in</u> the future that will include video testimonials along with an email campaign.

<u>Congress Update:</u> 2023 Congress had record breaking attendance with a total of 4,953 attendees. The Virtual Leadership Symposium held in May had 900 in attendance. Both educational events exceeded the overall satisfaction scores from previous offerings.

Strategic Planning: The Board reviewed the Mission, Vision and Values and the Strategic Plan – making no changes for the 2024-2026 timeframe. In 2024, ACHE will conduct a deep dive to gather and analyze information to inform the 2025-2027 plan. Your input as members is important. Attached you will find the current Strategic Plan for your review. Please send me any comments that you may have.

Here are some updates on work on the current plan:

<u>Trusted Partner:</u> ACHE is accelerating the use of technology to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing environment and improve digital experiences.

<u>Catalyst</u>: The focus in this area is Safety and Equity. ACHE will be creating a DEI narrative to drive awareness of ACHE's commitment to advancing DEI and health equity. Effort is also underway to create a DEI Competency Assessment Tool for individuals and a related blueprint for C-Suites leaders in healthcare organizations to effectively foster inclusive cultures and lead through a lens of equity.

Connector: ACHE is committed to growing our professional community across the healthcare continuum by leveraging partnerships with chapters and other organizations.

Al, Ethics and Interconnected Healthcare Ecosystems

The genie is out of the bottle: artificial intelligence. Generative AI. ChatGPT. It's all the buzz now. In healthcare IT, CIOs are being asked by leaders, physicians and staff: "Can we use ChatGPT?" "Is ChatGPT safe ... accurate ... will it save me time?" ChatGPT holds incredible promise to streamline work on harried clinicians, to enhance communication with patients and to drive efficiencies in many administrative functions. So, what is the role of the CIO when it comes to partnering with your organization to define the who, what, when, why and how of it all?

Generative AI is not like traditional software solutions such as an EHR that has been implemented and supported, optimized and managed through a governance process. Generative AI is a dynamic and learning technology that can produce varied types of content, including essays, images, poems or computer code. It can solve problems and even summarize large volumes of content. It is a very powerful tool, and as Winston Churchill said, "Where there is great power there is great responsibility."

The potential for generative AI to augment and complement our work is very exciting—and a bit frightening. What if the AI model builds its conclusions and recommendations off a data set wrought with bias? We have software modules that help clinicians identify disparities and care gaps in their patient populations (remember the boom of "pop health tools" in 2013 and 2014?) with the hope they will allow us to demarginalize cohorts of patients and focus on caring for the individual when and where they need it. While we continue to enhance those technologies and slice and dice the data from them, does AI introduce another hurdle we will need to climb to ensure health equity for our patients?

Al is also giving patients the opportunity to do more of their own due diligence before stepping into the doctor's office or sitting in front of a screen for a virtual visit. We know how, in some instances, physicians and care team members can do the very same thing. Who is responsible for

validating the information that scrolls onto our screen when it is asked a question? How can we as patients feel secure knowing that the conversations, the diagnosis and the treatment plan are from a trained provider and not some algorithm on an AI site? Does this change how we disclose, store or use data for research? Will consent forms need to be changed to reflect this emergent new world?

All of this is to say, healthcare leaders need a thoughtful plan that carefully evaluates the use of Al tools to identify and mitigate any unintended consequences, to protect the privacy of our patient data, to maintain the confidentiality of intellectual property and business intelligence, and to avoid the propagation of misinformation that could significantly affect healthcare decisions and health outcomes. This means that we need to think about what data is shared with Al platforms and how the data is delivered and used.

This will require strong governance and accountability, guided by the input of privacy and compliance experts, technology leaders, legal advisers and clinicians. While we work to establish the right protections, we want to encourage the innovation and flexibility to explore and study these tools within those boundaries, exercising caution and constraint around this exciting exploration.

It is on all of us to ensure this new opportunity is purposeful, effective and safe. It also needs to be transparent and explainable to clinicians, care teams and patients. Healthcare is built on trust between care teams and patients. This technology must not be allowed to damage that empathetic relationship; put to good use, it should augment the care we provide.

Striking this balance is no small effort. By coming together as an industry on this, we can ensure that these innovations make a positive impact that benefits us all.

An SC Prisma Health worker just won an Emmy. Here's why

A Prisma Health employee recently won an Emmy for a video he produced about a young patient with cancer. The Emmy winner was Anil Dhokai, a multimedia specialist on the marketing, communications and consumerism team for the South Carolina-based nonprofit health company, according to a Tuesday Prisma Health press release. The video he produced involved a child being treated at Prisma Health Children's Hospital in the Midlands. His video, "Nothing can stop child cancer patient after receiving prosthetic limb," won in the Health/Medical-Short Form Content category.

Dhokai created the video for social media during Childhood Cancer Awareness Month last fall while working with Senior Marketing Strategist William Cooke. "Anil and Bill's dedication and talent truly shine through in this video," Sally Foister, executive director of marketing insights and strategy, said in the press release. "It started with Bill identifying a great story and Anil's ability to bring it to life through video and storytelling." The focus of the video, Emily Prince, was diagnosed in 2019 with Ewing sarcoma, a type of cancer that occurs in bones or in the soft tissue around the bones. She was treated by Laura Pirich, MD, a pediatric hemotologist/oncologist, at Prisma Health's Children's Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders.

Following surgery to amputate her lower leg, Emily also worked with Bethany Borkoski, a pediatric physical therapist, who helped her relearn how to walk. "My care at Prisma Health was the best I could have imagined," Prince said in the press release. "I had the greatest nurses and the best doctors!"
